Three Environmental Education Organizations Team up to Get Washington's Children Outside

More than 10,000 low income children throughout Western Washington will connect more closely with the natural world around them thanks to a \$200,000 state grant awarded jointly to three of the state's leading nonprofit environmental education organizations – IslandWood on Bainbridge Island, North Cascades Institute in Sedro-Woolley and Olympic Park Institute in Port Angeles.

“No Child Left Inside” is a first-time grant program administered by the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission which announced today that \$1.5 million in grants has been awarded to education and recreation programs.

“Olympic Park Institute, North Cascades Institute and IslandWood are three leading providers of residential outdoor education in our state,” says Tom Sanford, executive director of Olympic Park Institute. “We are honored that State Parks and Recreation has recognized and funded our work in providing high quality outdoor education for Washington's kids.”

The program is an effort to help get children back outside to learn about and enjoy nature. Washington's children are as "plugged in" as the rest of the nation's children. They are spending more time indoors, on computers, watching television, and less time playing and learning outside. Outdoor education and recreation programs can help turn this trend around. These programs help reduce stress of our over-scheduled children, increase their attention spans, reduce absenteeism, create positive behavioral changes and increase overall test scores. Outdoor education programs help children gain the experiences and benefits of connecting with the great outdoors.

For many students, education begins and ends in the classroom, and teachers in underserved communities face increasing challenges when seeking to enrich their curriculum. For the first time, all 6th graders at Sequim Middle School were able to attend field science education programs at Olympic Park Institute last fall thanks to community support and generous donations. Suzanne Gray, a 6th-grade teacher at Sequim, says, “My kids are saying things like, ‘I will always remember this.’ Science competes now with P.E. and lunch for favorite subject!”

Frank Galloway, a former State Parks ranger, is manager for No Child Left Inside and also supervises Inside-Out, a State Parks youth and family camping program with a focus on cultural diversity. Galloway says he's seen first-hand the magic that happens for kids when they make a connection with nature. "You literally see the light go on in their eyes," Galloway says. "Learning about our environment and getting out in nature is very powerful for anyone – but especially for kids. It can provide meaning for their lives and give them a sense of confidence and self-reliance that branches out to other areas of their lives and helps them be successful. Programs like this also ensure that we are raising environmental stewards for the future."

Washington is the second state in the nation to grant state funds to outdoor education and recreation programs. Funding was provided by the Washington State Legislature and is expected to serve as a model for states throughout the country.

Sanford appreciates the unanimous support shown by our state representatives, "On behalf of the students being provided this experience, we'd like to thank our local legislators, Kevin van de Wege, Lynn Kessler, and Jim Hargrove."

The cooperative grant will help fund environmental education programs and subsidize participation in residential, multi-day environmental education programs by schools with a high number of low income, diverse students. In addition, it will help fund outdoor field trips, after school programs and other experiences in nature for low-income residents of the communities served by the partner organizations.
